

A Parent Guide To Understanding The California Spanish Assessment (CSA)

There are many ways to measure your child's learning. Your child's teacher uses report card grades, classroom work, teacher observations, and end-of-year statewide test results to get a complete picture of your child's learning.

Who Takes This Test?

All students in grades 3 through 12 are eligible to take the CSA.



Why Do Students Take This Test?

The purpose of the CSA is to give students information on their Spanish language arts/literacy skills in reading, writing, listening, and speaking. The test is intended for students who are seeking a measure of their Spanish literacy.

When Do Students Take This Test?

Each school decides when it will test in the spring. You will receive additional information from your school about the specific dates and times of testing.

How Do Students Take This Test?

This untimed test is taken on a computer which allows your child to interact with questions in a variety of ways. For example, your child might be asked to select answers or write a response to a question.

What Resources Are Available?

Your child will have access to resources they need when taking the test, like a zoom in/out feature or a highlighter. These resources help students access the test and do not affect the students' scores in any way. You can talk to your child's teacher about other available resources that may help your child.

How Can I Help My Child?
