The Butterfield Charter School was reviewed in February 2021 by the Accrediting Commission for Schools, Western Association of Schools and Colleges (ACS WASC) from the California Department of Education and earned a decision of the Commission granting a six-year accreditation through June 30, 2027.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the District's 2021-22 audit report is on extension. We have provided the 2021-22 Unaudited Actuals for the District that includes Fund 090 Charter School Fund.

## 1. Explain why the charter school did not meet the criteria for the funding level requested. Include specific measures or actions taken by the charter school to comply.

The primary mitigating circumstances that caused Butterfield Charter School to fail to meet financial criteria are directly related to the pandemic caused by COVID-19.

AB 130 was signed into law by Governor Newsom July 9, 2021. This law required school districts to provide an Independent Study option to all enrolled students. Additional guidance from CDE prohibited dependent charter schools, such as Butterfield Charter School, from offering the Independent Study option. In order to comply with the requirements of AB130, Porterville Unified School District implemented an Independent Study program separate from Butterfield Charter School.

As would be expected, non classroom-based ADA at Butterfield Charter School declined as students enrolled in the alternate Independent Study program. Butterfield Charter School increased recruitment efforts in order to comply with funding criteria. Additionally, Butterfield staff implemented a multi-tiered intervention program to increase attendance. The results of these efforts mirrored the experiences of other schools in the area and remained a challenge.

As was typical throughout the state, Porterville Unified School District experienced difficulty staffing the Independent Study program. Nine Butterfield Charter School teachers were assigned to staff the Independent Study program. The resulting decline in staff at Butterfield Charter School was a major contributor to the difficulty in meeting the funding criteria. For the greater part of the 2021-21 school year, Porterville Unified School District posted positions on Edjoin.org for Butterfield teachers in an effort to fill the vacant positions left by the teachers reassigned to the alternative Independent Study program. Qualified applicants for these positions were extremely scarce. Porterville Unified School District hired all qualified applicants, but was not able to fully staff the vacant positions.

Due to supply chain issues caused by COVID-19, student technology purchases were not completed during the 2021-22 school year. Student technology expenditures of over \$80,000 were postponed as the District attempted to locate vendors able to fill technology needs.

Due to supply chain issues and difficulty in coordinating contractors due to COVID-19 constraints, Butterfield Charter School facility needs were postponed during the 2021-22 school year. These projects included:

- 1. Installation of secure front entry for campus safety \$20,000
- 2. Campus signage and directional signage \$45,000
- 3. Outside learning area/lunch area \$175,000
- 4. Parking area medians repair and landscape \$45,000
- 5. Campus Security Fencing \$135,000

### 2. List and explain the mitigating circumstance(s) to be considered by the CDE and ACCS.

As the community returns to a degree of normalcy following the COVID-19 pandemic, Butterfield Charter school current expenditures show expenditures in line or in excess of funding criteria.

Fall Semester 2022-23 ADA at Butterfield Charter School was double the Fall Semester 2021-22 ADA. Student enrollment and student attendance rate have increased significantly due to reengagement strategies. These strategies are implemented by the increased staff hired to fill new and vacant positions. Please see attached year-over-year student attendance data.

Current year, 2022-23, staffing at Butterfield Charter School exceeds pre-pandemic levels. The 2021-22 decline in staffing due to a dearth of qualified applicants was a major contributor to the inability of Butterfield Charter School to meet the funding criteria. With current staffing, Butterfield Charter School expenditures are currently in excess of funding criteria.

Unfilled student technology purchases due to supply chain issues created an anticipated need for increased student technology expenditures in 2022-23 and 2023-24. Student technology is built on a rotating replacement schedule. The delay in purchases did not remove the need for the student technology purchases that were postponed in 2021-22.

Postponed facility needs are critical for the safety and efficacy of Butterfield Charter School. While the facility projects were postponed due to the pandemic, the need for these projects remains critical. The expenditure of funds on facility needs will bring Butterfield Charter School in line or in excess of funding criteria.
